

## Music Director



**David Crean** enjoys a multifaceted career as a conductor, teacher, recitalist, church musician, and radio personality. In July 2022 he was appointed the second music director of the Bach Society of Dayton. As an organist, Dr. Crean has performed in concert throughout the United States and completed two concert tours of Australia, where he gave several Australian premieres and performed on historic instruments. Other recent highlights include the opening recital of WQXR's "Bachstock" marathon, the Poulenc organ concerto with the Bach Society of Dayton, solo recitals at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine and St. Thomas Fifth Avenue in New York City, and several programs for American Guild of Organists (AGO) chapters.

Dr. Crean has taught organ, harpsichord, and music theory at Wright State University since 2014 and has held adjunct positions at Wittenberg University, The Juilliard School, and The University of Iowa. He also serves as the Dean of the Dayton, Ohio chapter of the AGO.

Since February 2017, Dr. Crean has been the Midday Host and Music Director at Discover Classical WDPR, Dayton's only full-time classical radio station. An active church musician since age 15, he currently serves as Organist and Director of Music at St. George's Episcopal Church in Dayton. Dr. Crean is in demand as a program and CD annotator, and has provided liner notes for a Grammy-winning recording. His first book, a history of the famed Hazel Wright Organ at Orange County's Christ Cathedral (formerly the Crystal Cathedral), was published in 2021.

A native of Long Island in New York State, Dr. Crean received his D.M.A. from The Juilliard School, where he was the 2014 recipient of the Richard F. French Doctoral Prize for outstanding research in a dissertation. He also holds degrees from Oberlin College/Conservatory and The University of Iowa.

## Accompanist



**R. Alan Kimbrough**, retired professor of English at the University of Dayton, is well known within the Dayton arts community as an outstanding organist-accompanist.

Dr. Kimbrough was the accompanist for the former Dayton Bach Society from 1974 to 2002. He is a long-time member of the American Guild of Organists and is currently a co-organist at the First Baptist Church of Dayton.

Stivers School for the Arts Choirs have displayed choral excellence by consistently earning superior ratings at Ohio Music Education Association (OMEA)-adjudicated events on the district and state level since 2016. The choirs have been selected to perform at the Ohio Choral Directors Association (OCDA) summer conference in 2020 (canceled due to COVID-19) and in 2022. Stivers Choirs have performed at the Schuster Performing Arts Center with the Dayton Philharmonic Orchestra; on stage at the Victoria Theatre with adult contemporary musician Jim Brickman; and in various venues with community groups such as the Bach Society of Dayton, Musica, the University of Dayton's Bella Voce, Wright State University's Women's Choir, and Fifth House Ensemble. In March 2023, the Stivers Chamber Choir and Chorale traveled to New York City for a residency with Dr. Derrick Fox and a concert at the famed Carnegie Hall. Stivers School for the Arts is part of the Dayton Public Schools system and has won the U.S. News and World Report Silver Medal for excellence in schools.

**Paula Dunn Powell**, director, serves as Director of Choirs at Stivers School for the Arts in Dayton, where she conducts six choirs and mentors a team of adjunct voice faculty and collaborative pianists. In addition to the choir honors her work helped attain that are described in the Choir paragraph above, her students have represented Stivers School for the Arts at Ohio All-State and National Association for Music Education (NAfME) All-National Choirs.

Ms. Powell's accomplishments include preparing her Symphonic Choir for performance in the Hometown Holiday concert with the Dayton Philharmonic Orchestra, and serving as a clinician and conductor for the Pennsylvania Music Educators Association (PMEA) Adams County Chorus Festival and as an adjudicator for the University of Dayton music honors recital. Ms. Powell regularly works to promote and develop a passion for the arts and nurture individual talent in the lives of her students.



**Jeffrey Powell**, accompanist, is well-known in the wider Dayton community, having served in a variety of musical capacities regionally. He has conducted musicals at Wright State University, Stivers School for the Arts, and The Muse Machine, and has conducted over twenty operas for Dayton Opera since 1991, when he was first appointed Director of the Dayton Opera Chorus. Since that time he has also taught music at Wilberforce University, Central State University, and Stivers School for the Arts, where he is currently Director of the Piano Magnet. As a keyboard artist, Mr. Powell has served as Organist/Choir Director at St. George's Episcopal Church and at St. John's Lutheran Church in downtown Dayton, as well as Choirmaster at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Oakwood. Prior to making Dayton his home, Mr. Powell served as Assistant Conductor of the Kansas City Symphony, Assistant Conductor of the Lyric Opera of Kansas City, and Choirmaster of St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Kansas City.

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
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
