John Neely is one of the most renowned musicians in the Greater Dayton region. He has been Music Director of the Bach Society of Dayton since its inception in 2002. His engaging personality, abundant musical skills, and ability to nurture musicians of varied ages make him the ideal musical leader of the Bach Society. For 29 years John Neely has been Associate Pastor for Music at Westminster Presbyterian Church in downtown Dayton. A superb organist and choral director, under his leadership Westminster Church has an active

music program for all ages with six singing choirs and three handbell choirs. Westminster offers musical programs that nourish the entire region.

Neely holds degrees from Duquesne University, Union Theological Seminary School of Sacred Music, and Pittsburgh Theological Seminary. He is an ordained Presbyterian minister. Prior to coming to Dayton he taught at Washington and Jefferson College in Washington, Pennsylvania, and at Mt. Union College in Alliance, Ohio. He has held leadership roles in the American Guild of Organists and the Presbyterian Association of Musicians. Neely is active in the tri-state area as an organ recitalist, choral clinician, and oratorio accompanist.



R. Alan Kimbrough, a professor of English at the University of Dayton, is well known within the Dayton arts community as an outstanding organist-accompanist. Dr. Kimbrough was the accompanist for the former Dayton Bach Society from 1974 to 2002. He is a long-time member of the American Guild of Organists and is currently a co-organist at the First Baptist Church of Dayton.



Scott Wise

Steven Winteregg is Professor of Composition and Dean of the School of Humanities at Cedarville University. He holds degrees from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music, Wright State University and The Ohio State University. He studied composition with William Steinhort, Gregory Proctor and Thomas Wells.

Jerry Noble

Steven Winteregg has received dozens of awards in composition. Among his awards are First Prizes in the New Louisville Brass Quintet Composition Competition, the "Joy of Life" Composition Competition, the International Horn Society's Composition Competition, and the

International Trumpet Guild's Composition Competition. He is a recipient of the Raymond Hubble/ASCAP Award and has received an ASCAP Plus Award in Composition every year since 1988. He has also received awards from the Montgomery County Arts and Cultural District, the Ohio Arts Council, the Ohioana Library Association and has received an Ohio Senate Resolution commending him for his contribution to the arts in Ohio.

He is the composer of four ballets, and his orchestral pieces have been performed by orchestras such as the Cincinnati Symphony, the Columbus Symphony, the Czech Radio Symphony, the Dayton Philharmonic Orchestra, the Delaware Symphony, the Indianapolis Symphony, the Milwaukee Symphony, the Orchestra of Augsburg, and the Sarajevo Philharmonic. His compositions have been recorded by the Dayton Philharmonic Orchestra, the Czech Radio Symphony, the Iceland Symphony, and the United States Air Force Singing Sergeants.

Today's Premiere

This concert includes the premiere of a new work, "A Dedication and an Amen," by the renowned British composer John Rutter (see biography on next page). The Bach Society of Dayton joined 13 other choral groups in the U.S. and the Bahamas in commissioning this work through Chorus America, the national organization that develops and promotes professional, volunteer, and youth choruses. The Bach Society's participation in this joint commissioning and premiere is made possible by an anonymous donor in honor of our Music Director, John Neely.

Each year, Chorus America creates a consortium of community and school choirs to commission a piece by an outstanding choral music composer. The composers contribute the commission so that all the proceeds support Chorus America's programs. In 2010, John Rutter graciously contributed "A Dedication and an Amen." Past composers include Eric Whitacre, Rollo Dilworth, and Paul Caldwell and Sean Ivory. The commissioning fees go directly to supporting Chorus America's work, which includes providing invaluable information for choruses, management and advocacy tools, conducting masterclasses, cutting-edge research, and greater visibility for the choral field.

The Bach Society is proud to be a member of Chorus America and to offer the Dayton area today's premiere. We hope you enjoy it.





John Rutter was born in London in 1945, received his first musical education as a chorister at Highgate School, and studied music at Clare College, Cambridge, where he wrote his first published compositions and conducted his first recording while still a student.

His compositional career has embraced both large and small-scale choral works, orchestral and instrumental pieces, a piano concerto, two children's operas, music for television, and

specialist writing for such groups as the Philip Jones Brass Ensemble and the King's Singers.

His larger choral works, *Gloria* (1974), *Requiem* (1985), *Magnificat* (1990), *Psalmfest* (1993), and *Mass of the Children* (2003) have been performed many times in Britain, North America, and a growing number of other countries.

He co-edited four volumes in the *Carols for Choirs* series with Sir David Willcocks and edited the first two volumes in the Oxford Choral Classics series, *Opera Choruses* (1995) and *European Sacred Music* (1996).

From 1975 to 1979 he was Director of Music at Clare College, whose choir he directed in a number of broadcasts and recordings. Later, he formed the Cambridge Singers as a professional chamber choir primarily dedicated to recording, and he now divides his time between composition and conducting.

He was honored in the 2007 Queen's New Year Honours List, being awarded a CBE for services to music.

Program Notes

Heinrich Schütz was a German composer and organist, generally regarded as the most important German composer before J. S. Bach and often considered to be one of the most important composers of the 17th century along with Claudio Monteverdi.

Schütz studied law at Marburg before going to Venice (1609-1613) to study music with Giovanni Gabrieli. He subsequently had a short stint as organist at Kassel before moving to Dresden in 1615 to work as court composer to the Elector of Saxony. He held that post until the end of his life (sowing the seeds of what is now the Dresden Staatskapelle) but left Dresden itself on several occasions. In 1628 he went to Venice again, most likely meeting Monteverdi there and perhaps studying with him. In 1633, after the Thirty Years' War had disrupted life at the court, he took a post at Copenhagen. He returned to Dresden in 1641 and remained there for the rest of his life.

Schütz's compositions show the influence of his two main teachers, Gabrieli (displayed most notably with Schütz's use of resplendent polychoral and concertato styles) and Monteverdi. His best known works are sacred music, ranging from solo voice with instrumental accompaniment to a cappella choral music. "Jauchzet dem Herren," a setting of Psalm 100, is taken from his Op. 2 collection, *Psalmen Davids sampt etlichen Moteten und Concerten* (Dresden 1619). Originally written for double chorus (SATB-SATB), the piece will be performed this evening with the second chorus part assigned to brass instruments.

Almost no secular music by Schütz has survived, save for a few domestic songs, and no purely instrumental music at all, even though he had a reputation as one of the finest organists in Germany.

Joseph Jongen, Belgian composer, organist, and pianist, had a distinguished teaching career, including extended appointments at both the Liège Conservatoire and the Brussels Conservatory; he was appointed director of the latter in 1925 and retired in 1939.

At the age of 25, Jongen began an intermittent four-year tour of Europe. As John Scott Whiteley reports in his article on Jongen for Grove, "In Berlin he encountered the music of Brahms and met Bruch and Richard Strauss, whom he heard direct the first performances of *Ein Heldenleben* and *Don Juan*. For a short time Strauss gave him composition lessons." [http://www.oxfordmusiconline.com/subscriber/article_works/grove/music/14472#S14472.1]

Jongen is perhaps best known for his organ compositions, particularly his Symphonie Concertante for organ & orchestra, Op. 81. His Op. 130 Mass-Messe pour chœr, soli, orgue (et orchestre de cuivres), composèe pour le VII^e centenaire de l'institution de la Fête-Dieu à Saint-Martin à Liege--was

first performed on June 23, 1946 at the Cathédrale-St. Paul, Liege, and dedicated to the memory of Jongen's brother Alphonse, who had been a canon at the cathedral. The performance this evening uses Jongen's original instrumentation (2 trumpets, 4 horns, 3 trombones, tuba, and organ), although Jongen later scored the work for only choir and organ and added the Credo in 1948. The brass parts for the Credo are the work of John Scott Whitely, who, along with Tom Cunningham, has included detailed editorial notes for the Oxford University Press edition of the vocal score. The work was first published in 1985.

Recordings of the work are relatively rare. The most readily available CD is a Hyperion recording by the Choir of St. John's College, Cambridge, conducted by David Hill, with the London City Brass and Paul Provost, organ.

John Rutter's biography and a discussion of the commissioning of "A Dedication and an Amen" appear earlier in the program. Rutter's *Gloria*, commissioned by the Voices of Mel Olson, was first performed on May 5, 1974 in Omaha, Nebraska, under the direction of the composer. This evening's performance uses the score for brass (4 trumpets, 2 tenor trombones, bass trombone, and tuba), timpani, percussion, and organ. An edition for full orchestra (2.2.2.2.-4.3.3.1, timpani, percussion, harp, and strings) is also available.




