

He recently retired as the Executive Secretary of Midwest Kodály Music Educators of America, and continues to give music education workshops throughout the Midwest.



Linda Kessler graduated *cum laude* with a Bachelor of Music in Piano Performance and Organ from Heidelberg University. She has over 25 years of professional experience as an organist, accompanist, and freelance musician at premier locations throughout the Miami Valley. She has played 6 international tours in 9 counties and has 15 years of experience teaching private piano and organ lessons. From 1990 to 1992, Ms. Kessler was the accompanist for the Whitewater Opera Company in Richmond, Indiana. From 1992 to 1995 she accompanied the Dayton Choral Academy at Wright State University, and Musica! from 2007 – 2012. Since 1998 she has been the accompanist for the Ket-

tering Children's Choir Chorale. She has conducted over 3000 Broadway musicals at La Comedia Professional Theater in Springboro, OH.

The **Kettering Advent Ringers** was formed in 1990 under the direction of Vic Kostenko, then executive director for the Handbell Musicians of America. The group routinely plays for worship services and has performed at several prestigious national and international events. The group uses a sixand-one-half octave set of Malmark[®] handbells, a six-and-one-half octave set of handchimes, and an additional 5-octave set of Schulmerich[®] handbells.



Joan Ulloth Dorgan, director, first played handbells at the Kettering Adventist church in the early 1980s. She soon founded a handbell choir for youth and another choir for adults. She has played in or directed almost every ensemble at the church and has performed as a solo, duet, and small ensemble ringer. She founded a small ensemble in 2002 and has coordinated the entire handbell program at the Kettering Adventist church since 2004. In 2012, she collaborated with two other musicians to establish an after-school handchime and handbell program for students in second through fifth grades at Spring Valley Academy.

Jim McCutcheon is a versatile musician, whose activities include classical guitar performance, teaching, arranging and composing. He has performed across the USA and in Russia both solo and with oboist Mark Twehues and has been the Guitar Advisor to the National Federation of Music Clubs for over two decades. McCutcheon writes CD reviews for Soundboard, the journal of the Guitar Foundation of America, and has presented lectures four times at their international conventions. As an Ohio Arts Council Touring Artist, he performs recitals for arts

councils and schools ranging from preschools through high schools. McCutcheon was a featured guitar soloist in the Bach Society's May 2015 concert, "South American Accents." He hosts "The Intimate Guitar," a weekly radio program on Dayton Public Radio, and serves as president of the Dayton Classical Guitar Society. McCutcheon holds a B.S. in Physics from the University of Dayton, where he is Artist-in-Residence, as well as a B.Mus. degree in Guitar Performance and an M.M. in Music Education, both from Wright State University, where he teaches as an adjunct professor. He presents assemblies and workshops on "The Science of Music" to people of all ages. With his wife, Debbie, he owns and teaches at McCutcheon Music, a music store and teaching facility in Centerville.

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
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
